

## Auswanderung Varnhorn 1882 – 1894

In dem Buch „Lohner Familien“ ist die Familie von dem Schneider Ludwig Varnhorn, Häusler auf dem Brink (bei der Pastoratsmühle) aufgeführt. Zwei Söhne und zwei Töchter des in der zweiten Generation genannten Franz Varnhorn und Bernardina Schaland sind in der Zeit von 1882 – 1894 getrennt nach Cincinnati ausgewandert, wo diese auch verstorben sind.

Der Sohn Bernard Varnhorn war Briefträger und Dirigent des MGV-Concordia Lohne und ist 1883 ausgewandert (Quelle: mgv-concordia-lohne.de).

Auch in Cincinnati konnte Bernard Varnhorn seine musikalische Begabung weiter frönen. Er war Organist in der katholischen St. Edward's Kirche \*3, die in der Nähe seiner Wohnung in der Clark Street, Ecke Mound Street gelegen war. Diese Kirche wurde 1965 geschlossen und ist heute eine Baptisten-Kirche. Er komponierte auch mehrere Musikstücke, hier ein Beispiel aus einem US-Copyright-Catalog von 1931:

Seine Haupteinnahmequelle war jedoch der Beruf des Zigarrenmachers. In der „Linn Street Nr. 1017“ hatte er ein von seiner Frau geerbtes Haus mit einem Zigarrengeschäft und Zigarren-Produktion. Sein Schwiegervater John Bruch verstarb 1907, damit erbte das Haus seine Tochter Mary. Diese verstarb dann 1912, womit das Haus in den Besitz von Bernard Varnhorn überging. Seine ledige Schwester Wilhelmina (Minnie) zog zu ihm und führte fortan den Haushalt. Später ist dann auch der verwitwete Bruder Frank eingezogen und war für die Zigarrenherstellung zuständig. Bernardina Elisabeth, verheiratete Schrinner, hatte 1888 die Heimat wieder besucht, auf dem Rückweg hat sie ihre Schwester Wilhelmina mitgenommen \*4

Im Jahre 1894 hatte Bernard offensichtlich noch mal seine Heimat besucht, zusammen mit seiner Schwester Wilhelmina \*4. Diese hatte auch 1905 und 1912 ihre Schwester Sopia, verheiratete Olberding, in Lohne in der Bleichstraße (Sägemühle) wiederholt besucht. \*4

## *Man, 80, Starves To Death In West End*

# Brother And Sister Are Found Famished Beside Body, With Food In Reach

Literally starved to death while an abundance of food was within arm's reach, the body of an eighty-year-old man was found last night by police on the floor of his Linn Street residence.

Staring vacantly at the dead man were his seventy-five-year-old brother and his sixty-five-year-old sister. Both were on the verge of collapse from lack of food. They are in a serious condition at General Hospital.

The dead man was Bernard Varnhorn, 1017 Linn Street. His brother and sister are Frank and Minnie Varnhorn, same address.

Bernard Varnhorn was the organist at St. Edward's Church, Clark Street and Wesley Avenue, for many years. He and his brother were retired cigarmakers. At one time they made cigars in a factory in the rear of their residence. The family owned the Linn Street house as well as other property, according to neighbors.

Late yesterday two newsboys, Robert Aichele and John Parinello, both of 922 Hopkins Street, called

at the Varnhorn home to deliver papers. Noticing that papers had not been taken into the house for four days, they looked through the window.

When they saw Bernard Varnhorn lying on the floor and his brother and sister, apparently helpless, sitting in chairs, they called Station X. Patrolmen Chris Cordes and Ray Elzenhoefer responded.

When the officers entered the kitchen they found the room in a condition of indescribable disorder. Papers and old clothes were strewn over the floor. Furniture was upset.

Bernard Varnhorn's body was lying on a pallet of old papers and clothes. The others were sitting on chairs, staring at the body.

Apparently mistaking the patrolmen for tax collectors, Frank Varnhorn asked when his taxes were due.

As the officers bent over Bernard, the brother said: "Don't bother him. He just hurt his foot. He'll get up in a little while."

Frank said his brother had been

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lying on the floor for three days. At the County Morgue, Coroner Frank M. Coppock, Jr., said the man had been dead for two days. Death was due to starvation, the Coroner said.

On the kitchen table were a half-consumed load of bread and part of a bottle of milk. On the floor was a pot of sauerkraut and meat which Frank apparently had been trying to feed to his brother.

Two lighted gas burners on the kitchen stove furnished the only heat.

Bernard Varnhorn was taken to the morgue by Patrolmen Robert Goke and James Gorman, Jr. He was dead on arrival.

The brother and sister were taken to General Hospital by Patrolmen Samuel Gough and Frank Drees. Hospital authorities said both were in a serious condition but were not expected to die. They were said to be suffering from malnutrition and general debility.

Inured as they are to tragic incidents, the officers said the scene was the most pitiful they ever had seen. The ghastly spectacle caused one policeman to verge on collapse.

Leo M. Limberg and his sister,

Miss Mary Limberg, 1013 Linn Street, said they had known the Varnhorns for more than 50 years. Both families have lived in the Linn Street houses for more than a half century.

Miss Limberg said that Bernard Varnhorn had been an accomplished musician years ago. Besides being the organist at St. Edward's Church, she said he had composed a number of musical selections.

Before Miss Minnie Varnhorn became too feeble to do her own housework, she was an immaculate housekeeper, taking great pride in her home, Miss Limberg said. But in recent months she had been reluctant to have anyone enter her home, a fact which Miss Limberg attributed to her unwillingness to have the condition of the house seen by neighbors.

#### A Question Of Pride?

It was probably this pride which prevented Frank or Minnie Varnhorn from seeking assistance when they became too feeble to care for themselves, Miss Limberg believes.

Only Thursday, Miss Limberg said, she saw Frank Varnhorn returning from market with a supply of food. She said he wore no overcoat and appeared to be "very feeble." It was probably this food, which they apparently were too weak to partake of themselves, which was found in the kitchen.

Miss Limberg said she believed the family was in comfortable circumstances. She said that a year ago, when they felt that the house was too large for their needs, the Varnhorns spent between \$600 and \$700 in remodeling the second floor in anticipation of renting it.

Patrolmen Cordes and Elzenhoefer reported that the front two downstairs rooms were in an orderly condition and well furnished. The front room contained a piano and an organ. Both rooms were covered with a thick layer of dust.

The only relative of the Varnhorns whom police were able to locate last night was Edmund F. Schrinner, Jr., 2972 McMicken Avenue, a nephew. Schrinner said he had not seen his aunt and uncles for two years.


